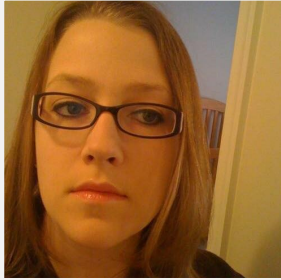

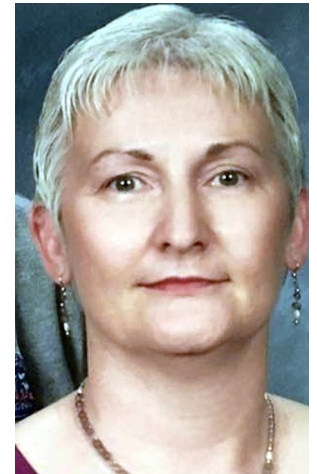

“The Rise and Fall of the Colonial Port of Dumfries: An Unpreventable Misfortune”

Driving through Dumfries, Virginia today, one would never guess that the town was once a bustling colonial port similar to Boston, New York and Philadelphia. The longest continually chartered town in Virginia located on Quantico Creek off the Potomac River, the colonial port of Dumfries was a promising center of commerce, politics and society. 1 Due to the booming tobacco trade, Dumfries was an economically prosperous waterfront community. That economic prosperity brought with it political prominence as well as high society. However, following the Revolutionary War, Dumfries began to decline, meanwhile other towns along the Potomac River flourished. The town leaders and merchants did all they could to save the struggling community. Unfortunately, their efforts were in vain. The same reasons for her rise are the exact reasons for her fall: economy, politics and society. The ruin of the once prosperous bustling port was unavoidable. [\(continued\)](#)

The American's Creed

100th Anniversary

"I believe in the United States of America as a Government of the people by the people, for the people, whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a Republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect Union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my Country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies."

Historical Notes: The American's Creed was a result of a nationwide contest for writing a National Creed, which would be a brief summary of the American political faith founded upon things fundamental in American history and tradition. The contest was the idea of Henry Sterling Chapin, Commissioner of Education of New York State. Over three thousand entries were received, and William Tyler Page was declared to be the winner. James H. Preston, the mayor of Baltimore, presented an award to Page in the House of Representatives Office Building on April 3, 1918. The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the commissioner of education of the state of New York accepted the Creed for the United States, and the proceedings relating to the award were printed in the Congressional Record of April 13, 1918. It was a time when patriotic sentiments were very much in vogue. The United States had been a participant in World War I only a little over a year at the time the Creed was adopted.

The author of the American's Creed, William Tyler Page, was a descendant of John Page, who had come to America in 1650 and had settled in Williamsburg, Virginia. Another ancestor, Carter Braxton, had signed the Declaration of Independence. Still another ancestor, John Tyler, was the tenth president of the United States. William Tyler Page had come to Washington at the age of thirteen to serve as a Capitol Page. Later he became an employee of the Capitol building and served in that capacity for almost sixty-one years. In 1919 he was elected clerk of the House. Thirteen years later, when the Democrats again became a majority party, they created for Page the office of minority clerk of the House of Representatives. He held this position for the remainder of his life.

Referring to the Creed, Page said: "It is the summary of the fundamental principles of the American political faith as set forth in its greatest documents, its worthiest traditions, and its greatest leaders." His wording of the Creed used passages and phrases from the Declaration of Independence, the Preamble to the Constitution, Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, and Daniel Webster's reply to Robert Y. Hayne in the Senate in 1830.

The Honor Flight Network flies Veterans from 127 cities here to Washington, DC to visit their Memorials at no cost to the Veterans. The easiest way to volunteer here is to greet our Veterans as their flight arrives at the airport or their buses arrive at the WWII Memorial.

Honor Flight's Mission

GOAL: Helping every single veteran in America, willing and able to board a plane or a bus, to visit THEIR memorials.

PRIORITY: Top priority is given to America's most senior heroes — World War II era veterans, and any veteran with a terminal illness who wishes to visit THEIR memorial. The program will naturally transition to Korean War, Vietnam War and all other veterans who served, on a chronological basis.

ELIGIBILITY: All men and women serving stateside or overseas.

PHILOSOPHY: Since America felt it was important to build a memorial to the service and the ultimate sacrifice of her veterans, the Honor Flight Network believes it's equally important that these Veterans actually get to visit and experience THEIR memorial.

Historic Kenmore Plantation



In 1929, The Garden Club of Virginia raised funds to restore the Kenmore gardens. Kenmore was the inspiration and first beneficiary of Historic Garden Week in Virginia . Beginning in 1992, The Garden Club of Virginia undertook another extensive redesigning and replanting of Kenmore's gardens. Without precise archival and archaeological data, the landscape that has been created is conjectural. In early garden plans, landscape architects Charles Gillette and Alden Hopkins treated the west front of the house as a tree-covered lawn in the 18th-century manner. The rear of the property was planted to a four-square garden edged in boxwood.

In later planning, by landscape architect Rudy Favretti, a major goal was to feature 18th-century and native plant material. In 1992, a Wilderness Walk was added to the southwest corner of the property. The creation of Wilderness Walks, containing native American plants, was popular in the 18th century.

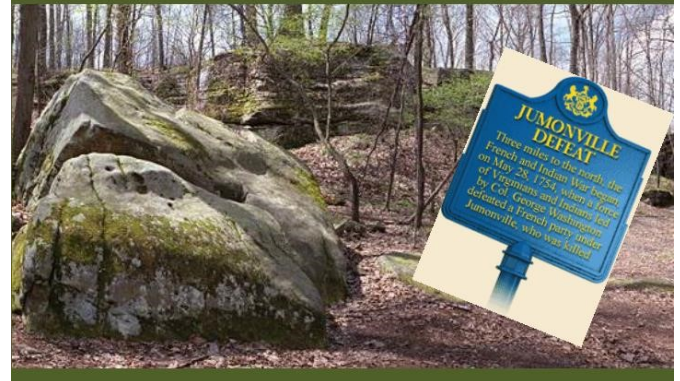
American Revolution Round Table of Fredericksburg

Hear the story behind two Hawaiian samplers recently acquired by the DAR Museum (Hawaii was named "the Sandwich Islands" by explorer Captain Cook). Both were made in schools founded by American missionaries, one by the daughter of missionaries and the other by a native Hawaiian girl at a missionary boarding school. The samplers— one in English, the other in Hawaiian— tell a story of two very different lives and the intersection of cultures, 50 years before the United States "annexed" Hawaii and 100 years before statehood. The samplers will be on view in the exhibit in the newly renovated museum gallery.

Chapter Development and Revitalization Commission, Executive Board

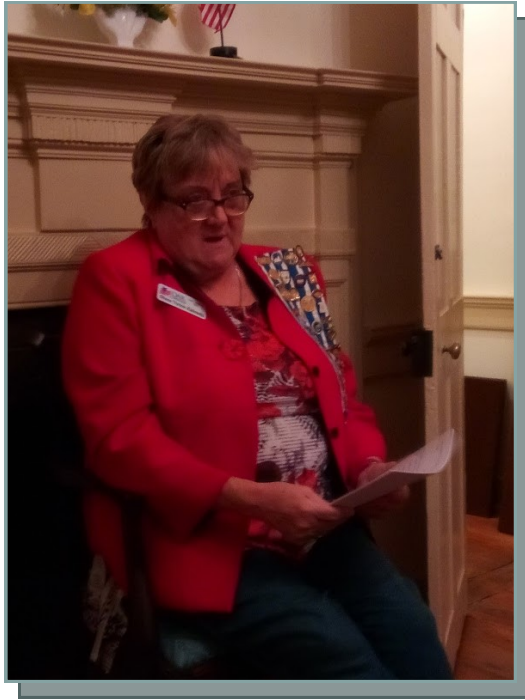
The CDRC: Attract * Inspire * Mentor!

Health Awareness

Blood clots do not discriminate. They can and do affect everyone: From children to senior citizens, professional athletes to mothers, women and men. No one is immune.

Each year, more people die due to blood clots than AIDS, breast cancer, and motor vehicle accidents combined. Yet, despite these facts, study after study has shown that fewer than one in four people have any recognition of blood clots or their signs and symptoms.
